# **Neighborly News**

#### A CONVERSATION WITH WAYNE SCALA Part II

Continued from February 2024 issue



When we left Wayne last month, he was in a prep school in Manhattan. He started applying to colleges only to be rejected. After reading about a new experimental college in New Hampshire founded by a group of professors from MIT, he applied and was accepted. Each professor was highly accomplished in their field and had only ten students per class. He was interested in so much and

started to thrive, being elected class president and joining the crew team. Not only was he busy with his studies, he was also busy with his girlfriend on one weekend and his boyfriend on the next. All was going well, until the girlfriend got pregnant. Thinking his attraction to men was "just a phase", he set out to "do the right thing" and married his girlfriend. He was 20 and she was 22 yrs. old. He dropped out of school and worked at various odd jobs for a year before enrolling at the much cheaper state college, while continuing to work. Two years later, their second child was born, money was even tighter so Wayne dropped out of college and went to work full-time as a reporter with a Concord newspaper. Apparently, he aced the writing portion of the interview even though his spelling wasn't good...they told him not to worry about that...logic and de-ductive reasoning to the rescue again. Needing to make more money, he applied for a job at W T Grant, a chain store and was offered a position in their executive training program. He said yes, since he would be making considerably more money, and off he went to Boston where he took a battery of tests and numerous interviews after which they taught him the basics of buying, selling, and managing. This marked the beginning of a 26-year career in corporate retail. His skill set was a perfect match for the challenges in this field and he excelled. He figured things out, continually broke records and got promotions. When he and his wife wanted to return to NY from NH, he was hired by Gimbels department store in NYC and was soon promoted to buyer of women's accessories. At 26 years old, his work life was going great even if he was working twelve hours a day. The marriage, on the other hand, was not. Unfortunately, at this point, the part of the marriage that leads to babies was still attractive and

his wife got pregnant with their third child when they were about to divorce.

After the divorce, Wayne moved into an apartment with a friend in NYC while he looked for his own place. He found an apartment that he could afford while making child support payments, got a second job at night at a drugstore, and sold his plasma every 2 weeks. Time went on, Wayne came out as a gay man and moved in with his lover, John. He remained friends with his ex-wife, visiting his children most week-ends. One time when his wife brought the kids into town, she and Wayne went to a company event while the lover babysat. It was all very cordial but that was to change.

Something happened one afternoon to trigger the trauma of his childhood molestation. As suppressed trauma is wont to do, it surfaced in its own time and he felt like "somebody hit me with a two by four across the head". His sister, a nurse, saw the signs and urged him to get help. He moved in with her in CT, committed to short-term inpatient therapy and ongoing psychiatric help. When he got out of his inpatient treatment, he received a letter from his ex-wife saying she had decided he couldn't see the kids anymore and told him the children didn't want to see him anymore. It was a devastating blow when he was already down. The best he could do at this point was to repeat the Serenity Prayer over and over that his mother gave him as a teenager. He instinctively knew that working during his recovery would be good for him, got his foot in the door at Lord and Taylor and started to receive the customary promotions.

Wayne and John both loved antiques so they decided to move 85 miles north to Milford, PA and open an antique store...life in the slow lane. Decidedly not a fit for fast lane Wayne so he gave Lord and Taylor's a call. They were happy to name him Director of Operations and task him with turning around their 13-year old large, yet always marginal store, in Atlanta, GA. It was a prosperous time for Wayne with two of his proudest achievements at L&T's being the placement of their first African American in an executive position and overseeing the turnaround of the store into the high profit margins. After a number of years, he and John decided to part ways, his time at Lord and Taylor's was coming to an end as the challenge had been met and a dear female friend who was also going through a divorce agreed to join him on a trip to Southern California. The plan was to take about six months off from work and relax....life in the slow lane. Fast lane

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#### A CONVERSATION WITH WAYNE SCALA

Wayne was looking for another work opportunity in three months. Hired by Southland Corporation in their Chief Auto Parts division, he was soon promoted and transferred to Dallas. While in Dallas, the AIDS epidemic was continuing to take the lives of too many of Wayne's closest and dearest people. He was going to memorial after memorial and starting to completely run down and burn out. It changed him. He watched a Joseph Campbell interview, the concept of "follow your bliss" resonated deeply and he started planning his escape from the corporate world. Over the next two years, he searched all over the US for a small gay friendly town. He visited a few and then picked us (of course!) for a longer look. He found The Highlands in a guide book, flew to Oakland, rented a car and came up without reservations. It was Women's Weekend in 1989 so there wasn't a room to be found anywhere in town! He went to Santa Rosa and came back on Sunday when he stayed for a week and decided this was probably it. He asked for and was given a transfer to Sacramento, got a condo in Vacaville so he could come to Guerneville once a month for a year and make sure he liked it in all seasons. He did, fell in love with the people and the climate, so here we are!

He opened up an antique shop on Mill Street which later moved over to First Street. It became a hang-out for people to talk about all sorts of things...gay issues, homeless issues, flood issues, etc. When he first got here, most of his friends were gay and/or merchants, he was loving the climate and doing quite well in the slower lane. There were other Guernevillians he wasn't so sure about in terms of homophobia and other issues but there were no conflicts. Then the floods of 95/96 came. Wayne's partner had just died and he lived alone with his cat while across the street lived two gay men and one lesbian who had two dogs and two cats. The whole menagerie gathered in Wayne's upstairs apartment and after a couple of days put out a white flag indicating they needed help. Here came the very people he wasn't sure about to the rescue! It was his first experience of Guernevillians coming together nomatter-what-when-where-or-who when disaster strikes. What he calls the "continuity of this community." He has also discovered this continuity when getting involved in various community problems, such as our interactions with the homeless community. This work

has resulted in forming alliances with people with whome did not originally see any common ground, only to discover that they share strong core values such as giving and expecting respect, individual rights, standing up against bullying and more. He's grateful for the many bridges between people that he's found in Guerneville and the lack of pretentiousness, calling it a kind of magic that he hasn't found elsewhere. He also hadn't found Bill Jackson elsewhere, his now husband of twenty years. Guerneville has been very good to Wayne!

Staying busy as always during his first year of retirement, Wayne got involved with our senior center when he volunteered as a delivery driver for Meals on Wheels about 16 years ago. Years later, he is now a regular at the Monday Zumba class which he really enjoys as well as various classes and occasional lunches. I first met Wayne at a Hanukkuh lunch at the Senior Center where he spoke briefly about finding out about his Jewish heritage only fifteen years ago. Curious about that story, I asked to interview him not knowing that all this other interesting stuff would come out and I wouldn't have room to write about my initial curiosity so you'll just have to ask him the story about that! About the same time he discovered his lost Jewish ancestry, he discovered his direct line to two signers of the Mayflower compact. A few years after that he was elected to a two year term as Colony Governor of the Redwood Empire Mayflower society. Currently, he's the VP of FROG (Friends & Residents of Guerneville.) He's proud to note that last year FROG raised well over \$100,000 from individuals and grants to install 56 security cameras on private property throughout the town of Guerneville, which continues to help protect all including our vulnerable homeless population.

It is a real pleasure getting to know Wayne, even if I do feel kinda lazy by comparison. A kind man with a strong heart and drive to bring out the best in himself and others, add Wayne to our list of Guerneville treasures.
