## Neighborhood News by Mary Bowers

REMEMBERING LENNY WEINSTEIN—Written March 2013

Lenny Weinstein is an interesting mix...Bronx native, Korean vet, journeyman sign painter, Sonoma County politico and self-taught artist. Interviewing him was a bit of a challenge at first because his innate curiosity kept leading him to ask me questions about myself. Once he got the hang of it, though, he was really fun and interesting to listen to!

Born in 1935 in New York and raised in Florida, Lenny worked many different odd jobs starting at the age of ten and on through high school. After graduation, he joined the Air Force and shipped out to Japan for two great years. He liked his job, working with radars in the head-quarters, and really like the Japanese people. He found them to be mild, giving, generous, nice people. He wishes he'd requested to stay in Japan but didn't, and got shipped back to Florida for the last 18 months of service...a long, boring, do-nothing time.

Four years later, out of the service and 22 years old, he was in no-man's land...not a civilian and not a GI. He soon found a job as a sign painter, trained by a journeyman who suggested he join the union. When he tried to join, he was told he was too old to become an apprentice. He thought, "Wait a minute! I've been off serving this country and now you tell me I'm too old?!" He marched to the Vet's office, told them what was happening, they called the union guy and said, "Get him in. Write whatever you need to on the form but get him in." And they did. I wonder if this is where Lenny's propensity for "fighting City Hall" began. (You'll see what I mean.) After completing the 4 year apprenticeship, he moved to San Francisco, the city he had shipped out of 5 years earlier, knowing then that he would return.

He moved into the Haight-Ashbury district during the Summer of Love. Having a steady job, he had neither time nor interest in participating in most of what was going on (doing drugs and dropping out) but he became a "student" of it. He concluded that the message they had to offer America was an important one...a message of love. The art that was coming out of that time also captured his imagination. This is when he started to teach himself art...painting, drawing, working with clay, making casts...things he uses to this day. "I saw kids ruining their lives by injecting drugs, my apartment was broken into and I lost a lot of stuff...but I still thought

what was happening was great." At the same time, he saw a San Francisco that was a blue-collar city and was good to her workers. Then he watched it "go under and become a tourist town" just like he'd seen in Miami. In the late 70's, he moved to Monte Rio. Soon, he unknowingly got into a war with CalTrans who wanted to cut 70 trees within a 3 mile stretch on Hwy 116. Lenny answered by making a bunch of hearts, putting one on each of the trees saying "This is a scenic highway!" He could not believe the amount of community support that started pouring in from around the country after the story hit the AP wires. Brenda Adelman was the first to let him know that "Scenic Highway" was a definable concept that could protect the trees, they could organize a meeting and he would have to run it. "I was scared but I did it...wore a tie and everything." After 5 or 6 years, a lot of paperwork and a lot of patience, planning and organizing, Hwy 116 was designated a Scenic Highway and the trees are still standing.

Next was the water company. "They (Citizens Utility Company)" were robbing us and other small towns all over the county." They didn't put any work into maintaining the system and "people were crying and showing jugs of brown water. It was awful." A group got together to change things, with Kathy Wyrick doing all the research. She was, tragically, killed in an auto accident but they were able to pick up the pieces and carry on. Again, it took years of work, patience, planning and organizing but they finally succeeded, forming the Sweetwater Springs Water District.

Then there's the toilets. This one took nine years and it all started with the redevelopment funds. "When you hear the word 'blight' look out...they're coming to take your property. I led the effort to stop it and learned a hell-of-a-lot about the politics of how the county is run. We took the case to court, lost it, appealed and lost the appeal. Redevelopment was in and I wanted to make good use of it. I felt that a public toilet was needed. You wouldn't buy a house without a toilet so why live in a town without a public toilet?" For 9 years he attended every meeting, stood up and asked for a toilet. "it became a joke!" When Efran was elected, he made it happen.



When I asked what else he wanted to tell me, his eyes started doing that little sparkly dance they do when his passion is aroused and he spoke about his artwork, saying he takes his time with it, all the time. "I love art. I think it's man's way of staying sane. We're performing art in our minds and actions all the time...

it's fitting things together...words, cars, houses...if we can only say we are part of art then everyone would know that they are an artist and might want to pursue it more. It soothes us."

Interesting mix, isn't he? I left one thing unsaid when I described his mix...a good heart, a very good heart.
